Here are some of the main trunks of thought that were brought up during the conversation:

Zero Waste and Business

- Keeping small businesses profitable while implementing zero waste measures
- Highlight business that are being zero waste leaders, and hear their thoughts.
- Use the cumulated data of talking with businesses to build a framework for forming bylaws
- Stores only carry packaging that can be recycled in the region they are selling in.
- Partnering with companies in victoria like (landscapers) using existing anchors to build on.

Zero Waste and Mindset

- Redefining what waste is? Everything that is thrown away is labeled "waste" when not everything that is thrown away is waste.
- Zero Waste is not about being perfect. It is about a shift in mindset. "I live within the realms of our society."
- · A tax on waste.
- Zero Waste Generalities:
 - Make the phrase, "Waste free is convenient," a common one.
 - Reduce over down-cycling
